I. Introduction

Uniform and dependable revenue information is needed to accurately analyze state and local government revenues. In RIPEC's opinion, a credible and commonly used source of comparative state and local revenue data is *State and Local Government Finance* compiled by the United States Census Bureau. Therefore, the analysis presented in this report is based on *State and Local Government Finance* data for fiscal years (FY) 2002, 2008 and 2013. Typically, in order to provide the analysis with a historical context, this report compares data from the most recent fiscal year with data from one decade prior; however, FY 2003 data was not available. Instead, this report opts for an eleven-year time period (from FY 2002 to FY 2013).

RIPEC's report, *How Rhode Island Compares – State and Local Revenues, 2015 Edition*, provides details on state and local government revenues for FY 2013, the latest year for which national data are available. The publication compares Rhode Island's revenues with those of the other 49 states and the United States average. To provide a common basis for comparison, revenues are shown on both a "Per Capita" and "Per \$1,000 of Personal Income" basis. This analysis provides two types of common denominators that account for differences due to the population of a state (per capita measurement) and the personal income level of the state (per \$1,000 of personal income).

RIPEC relied primarily on data made available through the United States Census Bureau's website in compiling this report. Per capita calculations were made using population estimates from the Census Bureau for July 1 of the first calendar year of the fiscal year in question. Additionally, personal income data from the Bureau of Economic Analysis for the four quarters comprising each fiscal year were used to calculate per \$1,000 of personal income.

How Rhode Island Compares – State and Local Revenues, 2015 Edition contains three sections in addition to this Introduction:

II. Highlights

- When all government revenues – including taxes; charges and miscellaneous revenues; intergovernmental revenues; and insurance trust, utility and liquor store revenues – are considered, Rhode Island’s total state and local revenues in FY 2013 ranked 23rd highest in the country as a share of personal income, and 15th highest on a per capita basis. In FY 2002, Rhode Island ranked 30th for total revenue collections per \$1,000 of personal income and 14th per capita.
- In FY 2013, Rhode Island’s total general revenue collections (total revenues minus insurance trust, liquor store and utility revenues) totaled \$207.24 per \$1,000 of personal income (16th highest in the United States), and were 8.0 percent greater than the national average of \$191.91.
- When measured on a per capita basis, Rhode Island’s general revenue collections of \$9,566 were 11.7 percent higher than the national average of \$8,565 and were 11th highest in the country.

Tax Collections per \$1,000 of Personal Income

- In FY 2013, Rhode Island’s total tax collections (a subcategory of general revenues) of \$111.18 per \$1,000 of personal income ranked the state 14th highest in nation. By comparison, the state ranked 10th highest in the country in FY 2002 (\$106.40 per \$1,000 of personal income).
- Of the six New England states, only Massachusetts (\$101.19) and New Hampshire (\$82.87) had total tax collections income below the national average (\$103.82) on a personal income basis in FY 2013. Five out of the six New England states (all except Maine) increased tax collections as a share of personal income in FY 2013 when compared to FY 2002.
- Rhode Island’s individual income tax collections of \$22.41 per \$1,000 of personal income in FY 2013 were less than the national average of \$24.14 per \$1,000 of personal income. Between FY 2002 and FY 2013, individual income tax collections as a share of personal income decreased by 7.4 percent in the Ocean State, compared to a 7.7 percent increase nationwide.
- Each New England state relied heavily on property taxes to support state and local governments; five of the six states—with the exception of Massachusetts—ranked in the top ten states nationally for property tax collections as a share of personal income in both FY 2002 and FY 2013. Property tax collections as a share of personal income increased in every New England state except Maine between FY 2002 and FY 2013.
- Rhode Island’s FY 2013 property tax collections of \$49.45 per \$1,000 of personal income were 52.2 percent higher than the national average of \$32.49. In Rhode Island, property taxes as a share of personal income increased by 15.1 percent between FY 2002 and FY 2013, compared to an increase of 5.3 percent nationally.

- In contrast to the property tax, general sales tax collections in New England are lower than the national average when measured on a personal income basis. In FY 2013, each of the New England states ranked in the bottom half of the country for general sales tax collections as a share of personal income. Rhode Island ranked 37th highest in the nation with collections totaling \$18.14 per \$1,000 of personal income, 22.2 percent lower than the national average of \$23.33.

Tax Collections Per Capita

- Rhode Island's total tax collections of \$5,132 per capita ranked the state 14th highest in the country and third highest in New England.
- Rhode Island's individual income tax collections of \$1,035 per capita were slightly below the national average (\$1,078 per capita), and increased at a slower rate between FY 2002 and FY 2013 than all of the other New England states except New Hampshire (which does not have a broad-based individual income tax).
- National property tax collections of \$1,450 per capita for FY 2013 were 36.5 percent lower than Rhode Island's collections of \$2,283 per capita (6th highest in the country).
- Between FY 2002 and FY 2013, per capita property tax collections increased by 65.0 percent in Rhode Island—the second fastest increase in New England (behind Vermont's increase of 73.6 percent).
- Rhode Island's general sales tax collections of \$837 per capita were 19.6 percent below the national average of \$1,041 per capita, but were the second highest in New England (behind Connecticut's \$1,073 per capita).

Other Revenues

- Rhode Island's FY 2013 charges and miscellaneous revenue collections (\$44.35 per \$1,000 of personal income and \$2,047 per capita) were the highest in New England as a share of personal income and on a per capita basis. However, both rates were below the national averages of \$46.39 per \$1,000 of personal income and \$2,070 per capita.
- Among the New England states, Maine, Rhode Island and Vermont each had intergovernmental receipts that were higher than the national average in both FY 2013 and FY 2002 when measured on personal income and per capita bases.
- Rhode Island's FY 2013 other non-general revenues (including liquor store, utility, and insurance trust revenues) were \$42.39 per \$1,000 of personal income, the highest in the New England region. The state's other non-general revenues of \$1,957 per capita for FY 2013 was the third highest in the region.

III. Overview and Summary

This section provides an overview of how Rhode Island's government revenues per \$1,000 of personal income and per capita compare to New England, the rest of the country, and the national average. Total Rhode Island state and local revenues in FY 2013 – including taxes; charges and miscellaneous revenues; intergovernmental revenues; and insurance trust, utility and liquor store revenues – were \$12.1 billion, approximately \$0.9 billion (7.5 percent) above FY 2012 collections. Nationally, FY 2013 state and local revenue collections totaled \$3.4 trillion, approximately \$0.4 trillion (12.7 percent) higher than FY 2012 collections. In total, Rhode Island's FY 2013 state and local revenues were the 23rd highest in the country as a share of personal income, and 15th highest per capita. Rhode Island's national rank has not changed substantially since FY 2002, when the state had the 30th highest total revenue collections per \$1,000 of personal income, and the 14th highest total revenues per capita.

The Census Bureau categorizes revenues by the funding source rather than by the administrative unit to which they are allocated. General revenues comprise all sources of revenue received from external sources (excludes intergovernmental transfers) with the exception of utility, liquor store and insurance trust revenues. In FY 2013, Rhode Island's total general revenue collections of \$207.24 per \$1,000 of personal income were the 16th highest in the country and 8.0 percent greater than the national average (\$191.91 per \$1,000 of personal income). When measured on a per capita basis, Rhode Island's general revenue collections total \$9,566, 11th highest in the nation and 11.7 percent higher than the national average (\$8,565).

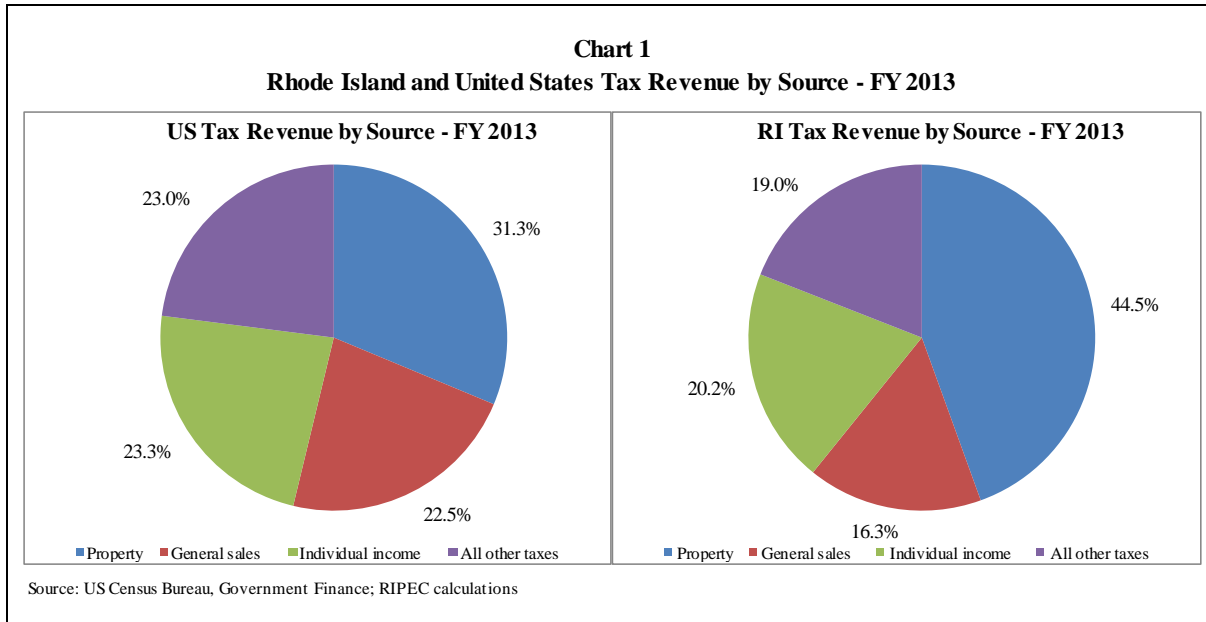

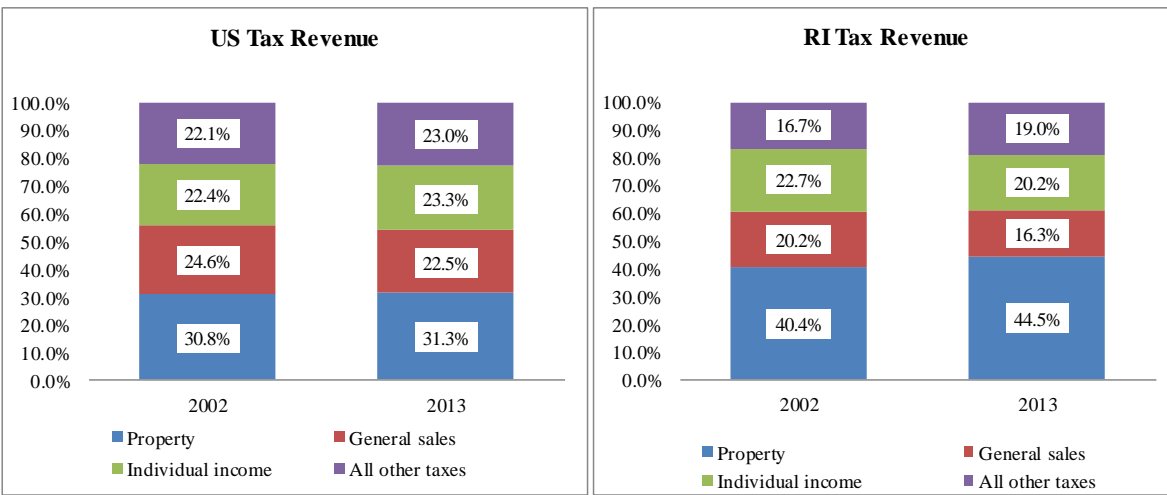
General revenues are divided into three major categories: taxes, charges and miscellaneous revenues, and intergovernmental transfers. Of the three categories, taxes represent the largest proportion of general revenues. In FY 2013, Rhode Island’s total tax collections as a share of personal income were \$111.18 per \$1,000, 7.1 percent higher than the national average of \$103.82 per \$1,000. On a per capita basis, total tax collections in Rhode Island of \$5,132 were 10.8 percent higher than the national average of \$4,634. The Ocean State ranked 14th highest in the country when tax collections were measured on both per capita and personal income bases.



In general, property taxes represent the largest share of total tax collections, accounting for 31.3 percent of all FY 2013 tax collections across the country. In Rhode Island, property taxes constitute an even larger share of total tax collections, accounting for 44.5 percent in FY 2013, or 13.2 percentage points greater than the national average. General sales taxes, individual income taxes, and other tax collections (excise, corporate income, etc.) account for a smaller share of Rhode Island tax revenues than the national average (22.5 percent v. 16.3 percent, 23.3 percent v. 20.2 percent, and 23.0 percent v. 19.0 percent, respectively).

Chart 2 displays the percentage of total state and local tax revenue that each source of tax revenue comprised in FY 2002 and FY 2013 in Rhode Island and throughout the United States. In FY 2013, property taxes accounted for the largest proportion of total tax revenue in Rhode Island (44.5 percent), as well as nationally (31.3 percent). Between FY 2002 and FY 2013, property tax revenue accounted for an increasing share of total state and local tax revenue in both Rhode Island and nationally. However, this share increased more rapidly in Rhode Island (40.4 percent to 44.5 percent) than nationally (30.8 percent to 31.3 percent). By contrast, between FY 2002 and FY 2013, individual income tax collections increased as a share of total state and local tax revenue nationally (22.4 percent to 23.3 percent), but decreased in Rhode Island (22.7 percent to 20.2 percent). General sales tax collections made up a larger share of overall tax collections nationally and in Rhode Island in FY 2013 than in FY 2002.

Tax Collections per \$1,000 of Personal Income

Total FY 2013 tax collections across the New England states, as a share of personal income, ranged from 47th highest in the country in New Hampshire to 5th highest in Maine, with Vermont and Connecticut close behind, ranking 6th and 8th, respectively. Rhode Island’s total tax collections of \$111.18 per \$1,000 of personal income were 14th highest in the country and fourth highest in the New England region. Of the six New England states, only Massachusetts and New Hampshire had total tax collections below the national average, though Massachusetts’ collections of \$101.19 per \$1,000 of personal income were close to the national average of \$103.82. Between FY 2002 to FY 2013, taxes as a share of personal income increased in five of the six New England states (all except Maine).

FY 2013 individual income tax collections per \$1,000 of personal income were higher than the national average in three of the six New England states (Connecticut, Maine, and Massachusetts). Rhode Island’s individual income tax collections of \$22.41 per \$1,000 of personal income were slightly below the national average of \$24.14 per \$1,000 of personal income. Between FY 2002 and FY 2013, individual income tax collections as a share of personal income decreased by 7.4 percent in the Ocean State, compared to an increase of 7.7 percent nationally.

All six New England states relied more heavily on property taxes to support state and local government than the national average. Five of the six states, with the exception of Massachusetts, ranked in the top ten in property tax collections as a share of personal income in both FY 2002 and FY 2013. Rhode Island’s FY 2013 property tax collections of \$49.45 per \$1,000 of personal income were 52.2 percent greater than the national average of \$32.49. New Hampshire’s collections were even higher at \$53.12 per \$1,000 of personal income, or 63.5 percent greater than the national average. Vermont followed closely behind New Hampshire at \$52.35 per \$1,000.

Property tax collections in New England also increased faster than the national average between FY 2002 and FY 2013. In Rhode Island, property taxes as a share of personal income increased by 15.1 percent between FY 2002 and FY 2013, constituting the second largest increase in the region (behind Vermont’s 17.8 percent increase). Nationally, property tax collections increased by 5.3 percent over the eleven-year time period.

In contrast to the property tax, general sales tax collections in all six New England states were lower than sales tax collections nationally. In FY 2013, none of the New England states ranked in the top half of the country for general sales tax collections as a share of personal income. New Hampshire’s general sales tax collections were the lowest of the New England states, due to the absence of a sales tax. Rhode Island’s general sales tax collections of \$18.14 per \$1,000 of personal income were 22.2 percent lower than the national average of \$23.33. Over the eleven-year period studied in this analysis, Rhode Island’s sales tax collections decreased by 15.6 percent as a proportion of personal income, while general sales tax collections also declined nationally and in every New England state, with the exception of New Hampshire and Vermont.

Tax Collections Per Capita

On a per capita basis, total state and local government tax collections ranked in the top half of the nation in every New England state except New Hampshire (New Hampshire ranked 26th) during FY 2013. Moreover, between FY 2002 and FY 2013, total state and local tax collections per capita grew faster than the national average in every New England state, with the exception of Maine. Rhode Island's total tax collections of \$5,132 per capita ranked the state 14th highest in the country and fourth highest in New England. Additionally, Rhode Island's per capita tax collections increased by 49.8 percent between FY 2002 and FY 2013, compared to a 45.9 percent increase in the national average.

Among the New England states, per capita individual income tax collections were greater than the national average in Connecticut (2nd highest), Maine (16th highest) and Massachusetts (4th highest). Rhode Island's individual income tax collections of \$1,035 per capita were slightly below the national average of \$1,078 per capita. In addition, Rhode Island's per capita individual income tax collections increased at a slower pace than the national average between FY 2002 and FY 2013, as well as each of the other New England states with the exception of New Hampshire (which does not have a broad-based personal income tax). During this time period,

Rhode Island's per capita individual income tax collections increased by 32.8 percent, compared to an increase of 51.4 percent in the national average.

Per capita property taxes across New England were universally higher than the national average; all six states in the region ranked among the top ten nationally in FY 2002, and all but Maine (11th highest) ranked in the top ten in FY 2013. The national average of \$1,450 in per capita property tax collections for FY 2013 was 36.5 percent less than Rhode Island's collections of \$2,283 per capita (6th highest in the country), and 46.8 percent less than in Connecticut (2nd highest in the country and highest in New England). Between FY 2002 and FY 2013, Rhode Island's per capita property tax collections increased by 65.0 percent, the second largest increase in New England.

Measured on a per capita basis, general sales tax collections were below the national average in every New England state except Connecticut in FY 2013. Rhode Island's general sales tax collections of \$837 per capita were 19.6 percent below the national average of \$1,041 per capita, but were the second-highest in the region (behind Connecticut at \$1,073 per capita). Since FY 2002, general sales tax collections in the Ocean State have increased by 21.0 percent, compared to an increase of 33.1 percent in the national average. Among the New England states, per capita general sales tax collections increased the most in Vermont (62.9 percent).

Other General Revenues

In addition to taxes, general revenues are composed of three additional Census Bureau categories: intergovernmental revenues, current charges, and miscellaneous revenues. The extent to which governments rely on these sources of revenue varies across the country, although they account for a smaller share of total revenues than taxes.

Current charges are funds received by governments from the public in exchange for the performance of certain services or commodities (other than liquor stores and utilities). Examples of charges included in this category are higher education charges, such as tuition and bookstore receipts, elementary and secondary school lunch and milk sales, highway toll revenues, and publically-operated air and sea transportation facilities. Miscellaneous revenue is a "catchall term" for revenues that do not fit into the taxes, intergovernmental or charges categories, including interest and dividend income, property sales and royalties. Table 4 shows the charges and miscellaneous revenue as well as intergovernmental revenue on personal income and per capita bases for the six New England states in FY 2013 and FY 2002.

In general, the New England states rely less on charges and miscellaneous revenues than other states. In both FY 2002 and FY 2013, all of the New England states ranked in the lower half of the country for revenues generated through charges and miscellaneous revenues on a personal income basis. In FY 2013, Rhode Island was closest to the national average for charges and miscellaneous revenues on both personal income and per capita bases among the New England states. Rhode Island's charges and miscellaneous revenue collections of \$44.35 per \$1,000 of personal income ranked the state 32nd highest in the nation in FY 2013, and the highest in New England. When measured on a per capita basis, charges and miscellaneous general revenues generated \$2,047 in Rhode Island in FY 2013, the 27th highest level of collections in the nation.

Intergovernmental revenues include federal and state grants (e.g. general support, health, and education grants), but exclude state-to-state payments from intergovernmental transactions. In New England, Maine, Rhode Island and Vermont each had intergovernmental receipts that were higher than the national average in both FY 2013 and FY 2002 when measured as a share of personal income. On a per capita basis, four of the six New England states (Maine, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and Vermont) had higher levels of intergovernmental revenues compared to the national average in FY 2013. Rhode Island's FY 2013 per capita intergovernmental collections exceeded the national average by \$526, or 28.4 percent. In FY 2002, only three New England states (Maine, Rhode Island, and Vermont) had per capita intergovernmental revenues that exceeded the national average.

Other Revenues

The Census Bureau categorizes government revenues into four categories: general government (all revenue sources not described by the following three categories), utilities (water, gas and electric power and public mass transit owned and operated by a government or with government oversight); liquor stores (state- or locally-owned and operated by governments); and social insurance trusts (social insurance operations for which a government maintains accounting trust

funds separate from other funds or financial activities of the government; the system must also provide a social purpose including public employee retirement systems, unemployment compensation, state workers' compensation systems, and disability insurance trusts). Revenues from the three non-general revenue categories are subsequently classified separately in the Census Bureau data. Table 5 outlines the amount of other revenues generated by the New England states and the United States on per capita and personal income bases.

Social insurance trusts constitute the largest share of the three “non-general revenue” categories; state and local governments saw a significant revenue increase in this category in FY 2013, which had an effect on total revenues for the year. Total other revenues were substantially greater in FY 2013 than in FY 2002; this can possibly be attributed to the fact that FY 2002 occurred during an economic recession. Program revenues that are included in this category, such as temporary disability insurance, are heavily dependent on payroll tax collections that often decline during economic recessions or periods of increased unemployment.

Revenue Changes between FY 2009 and FY 2013

Table 6 provides annual per capita revenue collections for Rhode Island and the country as a whole for the FY 2009-2013 period, allowing us to examine the impact on government revenues of the economic recovery since the end of the Great Recession. As this table demonstrates, total revenues have increased over the course of the ongoing recovery, both locally and nationally. Between FY 2009 and FY 2013, Rhode Island collections increased by 62.6 percent (from \$7,085 to \$11,523 per capita) and national collections increased by 60.3 percent (from \$6,790 to \$10,887 per capita). However, Rhode Island and national revenue collections were actually slightly lower in FY 2013 than in FY 2011, the FY 2009-2013 peak, by approximately 4.8 and 2.1 percent, respectively.
